<p>Modules and Credits</p>	<p>You will study three modules per semester, but we ask you to choose more modules in case some of your choices are not available.</p> <p>Most modules earn you 20 credits and you may take up to 60 credits per semester.</p> <p>The total number of credits you should take are:</p> <p>One semester: 60 credits (equivalent to 30 ECTS credits) Full year: 120 credits (equivalent to 60 ECTS credits) Module catalogue: to be provided after application</p>
<p>Module Exceptions and possible issues</p>	<p>Nursing and Psychology modules are only available where a direct agreement exists between your department within your university and the University of Hull. Please seek advice from your home coordinator and do not choose these modules if an agreement does not exist.</p> <p>Certain Social Work and Youth and Community Development modules are unavailable due to DBS checks required (working with vulnerable people/children) and other government constraints.</p> <p>Regrettably we do not offer exchange opportunities on our Medicine programmes.</p> <p>Note it may not always be possible to approve your module learning agreements in advance. If you need comparable modules you MUST ensure that you note this with your application as this may not be possible given the constraints for module choices which are: Modules may not be running; You may not have the module prerequisites; timetable clashes; space availability.</p>
<p>Entry Requirements</p>	<p>Academic Entry Requirements You will need to be a current student in good academic standing at your university, and have completed at least one year of your course. We assess each application individually.</p> <p>English Language Requirements for Exchange students All classes are taught in English, therefore students are expected to be proficient in the English language to be capable of understanding, writing reports, making presentations and completing exams.</p> <p><u>English language requirements for Exchange students</u></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • If you are a student who will study the exchange programme for one trimester you will need to provide a letter from your study abroad / exchange / Erasmus+ coordinator or an academic member of staff from your home University stating that your level of English is a minimum of B2 along with any other certification you have. On entry you will currently be required to hold a Standard Visitor Visa. • If you are a student who is studying for a full academic year you will need to provide evidence of your English Language Proficiency (ELP). This must be one of these accepted tests. You are required to apply for a student visa before entry to the UK and will be allocated a Confirmation of Acceptance for Studies (CAS) only after you have provide sufficient proof of ELP, along with an up to-date passport and reference.

	<p>You will need the following documents for your online application which you will need to download:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • A copy of the formal nomination from your home University, if you do not have this it is not essential. However all other documents MUST be downloaded. • A photocopy of your passport (an Identity Card may be acceptable for EU students but passports are recommended). • A transcript of your results from your University studies, achieved so far. Please provide a separate list of all of the courses you have taken in the past indicating the grades you have achieved. • A letter of recommendation from an academic member of staff at your university. The letter should describe how the member of staff knows you, why you are suitable for the course and confirm you are in good academic standing. <p>Evidence you meet the English language requirements. Choose your modules	<p>You are likely to study three modules per semester, but we ask you to choose more modules in case some of your choices are not available.</p> <p>Most modules earn you 20 credits and you may take up to 60 credits per semester. Receive your email confirmation	<p>We will email you to confirm your place at the University of Hull and with details of what to do next.</p> <p>Your learning agreement will be marked as provisional and returned, to you and the coordinator outlined. Your final learning agreement will not be completed until you are on campus</p>
Apply for your visa, if applicable	<p>All international students may require a visa to study in the UK. We will email you with information about visa applications and UK entry documents. The information you receive will depend on the length of your study and modules you have chosen.</p> <p>Trimester 1 students only will currently need a standard visitor visa (studying). Most students will be allocated this on entry to the UK, however, this will depend on your nationality and some will need to apply for the visa before arrival. You can check your status here</p>
Arrange your accommodation	<p>The application deadline to apply for accommodation will close on 1 June (trimester 1) and 31st October (trimester 2). So students should apply as soon as they receive their application to study information. If you wish to apply for University accommodation, you will need to do the following, during the application opening dates;</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Register for an account using this link. • Provide your personal details • Confirm the academic course you will be studying commencing September /January from the drop down list • Use your current email address as this will become Username/Login for accommodation only. Important: <u>This will not be your University username / login which will be sent to you in August / September just before arrival</u> • Create a password <p>When you have set up your account this will then need to be validated by the University. Once the validation process has been completed you will receive a confirmation email and be able to access the accommodation portal to book your accommodation and accept a residence contract.</p>

	<p>If you do not wish to stay within the University's campus provision, you will need to arrange accommodation in the private sector.</p> <p>Please also be aware that accommodation is not guaranteed so early application is advised. Opening a bank account	<p>During your first two weeks, you will have the opportunity to open a bank account.</p> <p>It is sometimes difficult for students who are studying for up to six months to open an account, however, some banks allow students to open basic or savings accounts. The process of opening accounts is lengthy.</p> <p>There are several different banks to choose from, if you have not already decided. Please visit the banks and select which one you would like to use. If you are arriving in September, you will have the opportunity to meet different bank representatives on campus.</p> <p>My Journey which is your student portal accessible in September and January and Student Central staff will provided you with further details.</p>

<p>Registering with a GP</p>	<p>If you're moving to Hull, can register with a GP.</p> <p>All international students who are studying in the UK on a course of study of six months or more, pay for the National Health Service (NHS) treatment from the beginning of their stay, alongside their visa application. This means that you can access free NHS health care provision, and you can register with an NHS doctor, known in the UK as a General Practitioner (GP). Most GPs work together in groups, known as GP Surgeries.</p> <p>You will normally register as an NHS patient with a GP Surgery, rather than with an individual doctor. You should register with a GP surgery as soon as you arrive in the UK, do not wait until you become unwell, as you may not be able to get the health care you need.</p> <p>The easiest way to find a GP near you is to visit the NHS Choices website and enter the postcode of your student accommodation, please see http://www.nhs.uk/Service-Search/GP/LocationSearch/4</p>
<p>Medical Insurance</p>	<p>If you are in the UK for less than 6 months, you must ensure you have adequate medical insurance before travelling.</p> <p>You can still register with a GP surgery but will be required to pay for any subsequent consultations or medical treatments.</p>
<p>Visa</p>	<p>All students need a visa to enter the UK.</p> <p>Single trimester students currently enter the UK on a Standard visitor visa. You will not be permitted to extend your programmes for the full year if you enter on this visa.</p> <p>Full academic year students MUST apply for a student visa. This cannot be completed until you have been issued a Certificate of Study (CAS) which is sent by the University admissions team, usually in August annually.
